

English 301: Medieval Women and Literature

THIS COURSE MEETS THE BRITISH LITERATURE BEFORE 1800 REQUIREMENT FOR ENGLISH MAJORS AND MINORS

This course introduces students to the literature written by, for, or about women during the Middle Ages. We will read romances, love letters, mystical and visionary texts, virgin martyr biographies, courtly literature, autobiographies, and medical treatises on women and their many "secrets." As we read, we will consider the role of writing and reading in constructing medieval understandings of gender and in organizing the female body. Readings will be in Middle and Modern English but no experience with medieval literature or Middle

English language is required. Course requirements will include essays, oral presentations, exams, and enthusiastic participation in class discussion.
