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
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Spooktacular Writing Contest

What is National Novel Writing Month?

Every November, creative writers come together for National Novel Writing Month (NaNoWriMo). The goal: write 50,000 words—the standard length of a novel—in one month. That is 1,667 words per day. Whether you strive for that goal or one of your own making, participating in NaNoWriMo is a great way to make progress on your writing and find support from the writers around you.

The NaNoWriMo organization provides tools and encouragement to participating writers. Their <u>website</u> helps writers make goals, track progress, connect with other writers, and more. They also have <u>novel preparation resources</u> available. NaNoWriMo hosts other events and activities as well, such as flexible writing challenges in April and July. Their site is free to join.

A Chat with Hopwood Award Winner Jina Bhagat

Will YOU be the next Hopwood Award winner?

If you want to stand alongside hundreds of prominent U of M writers and earn prize money for your work, you have until January. Submit to the <u>Hopwood Writing Contests!</u> The <u>Roy W. Cowden Memorial Fellowship</u> specifically is a great opportunity for UM-Flint undergrads. They accept multiple forms of writing, and one winner from each campus is guaranteed.

Jina Bhagat was the UM-Flint winner of the Roy W. Cowden Memorial Fellowship in 2023. I sat down with her to talk about her writing and her contest experience. Jina told me she started creative writing in high school and has loved it ever since. When I asked where she finds her inspiration, she shared that it's from the mundane, like daily interactions with people she meets. "It's the people you don't often look at, who often get neglected by the larger world," she added. These are the moments she gains ideas from and includes in her writing journal.

I asked what motivated her to submit her work to Ann Arbor's renowned Hopwood Writing Contests. She said she was weeks away from graduating when she heard about them. She'd never submitted to a contest before and didn't believe she'd win, but she scrambled to prepare a last-minute submission anyway. That entry was *Blue*, a poetry collection. Her leap of faith not only earned her prizes, but also boosted her confidence in her craft. She said "there's this real fear that it's not going to get selected, but don't let yourself back out. Just submit. See what happens. If it's your passion to write, then you have to put in the effort." Even if you don't win, Jina assured that it is still a valuable experience. You will get more comfortable sharing your work with others, and you will also gain experience preparing and submitting work.

Jina discussed that even with a busy course load, it is possible to balance academic work and writing. She finds it important to have break time in her schedule, and writing is a therapeutic way to spend it. If able, working ahead for classes can help clear up more free time for writing. If you're planning to enter the Hopwood Contests, Jina suggests starting early if possible. Researching contest criteria is a great place to start so you know what guidelines to keep in mind. Jina's story drives home that it's never too late to begin a submission. Even if you aren't confident you'll win, submit anyway! The results may surprise you.

Getting feedback from the Writing Center can help as well. Appointments can serve as soft deadlines to help spread out writing time before a piece is due. You can also gain valuable insights from seeing another perspective on your work.
